**Barriers to Access Health Care Services for Transgender and Gender Dysphoric Population Enrolled in Medicaid** Brenda Matheu 2021 Transgender and people with gender dysphoria account for about 1 million of the U.S. population. This population encounters many barriers to access basic healthcare services. The barriers include discrimination in healthcare settings from staff and providers, and lack of insurance coverage for medically necessary treatment of gender dysphoria. There is a reported shortage of medical providers that are proficient in basic transgender health and many are denied services due to this reason. Transgender individuals report multiple encounters in health care organizations where they are discriminated based on gender, and staff including providers lack proper gender-sensitive knowledge. The unwelcoming healthcare setting discourages the transgender and gender dysphoric patient to seek medical care to avoid unpleasant, uncomfortable and triggering encounters. A high percentage of transgender people state that they delay medical care even when medically necessary to avoid the stress of not being socially accepted. The result of lack of patient follow-up and care of transgender and patients with gender dysphoria experience promote many health disparities including depression, anxiety, STD treatment and prevention including HIV, and other chronic health problems. Transgender population reports high unemployment rates and high poverty levels, placing them disproportionately in the eligibility criteria of Medicaid. There is an insufficient coverage for gender-affirming care such as gender-affirming hormone therapy (GAHT) and gender-affirming surgery (GAS) through the



use of state and federal-funded programs such as Medicaid. The Affordable Care Act (ACA) has aided efforts for inclusive medical care coverage under Section 1557, a non-discriminatory inclusion, but coverage remains limited and access at an all-time low. Improving access to healthcare services by training more providers in transgender health and becoming gender-sensitive to reduce discrimination is essential to significantly improve the quality of life and health disparities among the TG community.
