However, we focus on the core elements in this paper to delve deeper and facilitate a richer discussion about these components. No one-size-fits-all approach to the development and implementation of literacy programs exists; the local context and constraints of any implementation can require adaptation and adjustments. In many cases, the fully diversified approach to early grade literacy instruction described in the classroom scenario has not yet been achieved. However, we hope that this compilation of lessons learned and best practices achieved through our experiences will help to further the efforts of all to provide high-quality, effective literacy instruction to all learners, particularly those in LMI countries.

Differences and Similarities in the Eye Tracking Patterns of Skilled and Less Skilled Reading Comprehension in Middle School Students Katrina Christie 2013 The purpose of this study was to examine readers' attention, as indicated by eye tracking data and think-alouds, as the readers responded to Question Answer Relationship (QAR)-based questions. This study took place at a mid-sized Midwestern university. The participants of this study included fourteen 6th-8th grade students from a local middle school. Eight of the participants were at or above grade level on the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Reading test. For the purposes of this study, they were called Skilled Comprehenders. Six of the participants, Less-skilled Comprehenders, were below grade level. Each participant read four passages and answered sixteen comprehension questions. These comprehension questions were broken into four categories: Right There, Think and Search, Author and Me, and On My Own. Each participant answered four of each type of question. There were similarities in the way that Skilled and Less-skilled Comprehenders handled the different types of questions. For example, both groups were able to improve their comprehension score considerably when attempting the question a second time. Additionally, both groups had a considerably difficult time with Think and Search questions. There were also some notable differences. Some Less-skilled Comprehenders struggled using appropriate look-back strategies for different question types, especially the On My Own questions.
