However, human rights concerns are confronted everyday by people in this democracy, including children. The purpose of this volume is to bring attention to the fact that against the backdrop of neoliberal expansion, serious human rights violations are taking place among children everywhere, including in the US. The daily struggles among groups of school children in the US are specifically considered here, such as children who are sorted by race, homeless children, transient children, child refugees, children as targeted by human traffickers, and/or child migrant workers. [Estimating the Prevalence of Human Trafficking in the United States: Considerations and Complexities](#) National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine 2020-02-27 Human trafficking has many names and can take many forms - pimp control, commercial sex, exploitation, forced labor, modern slavery, child labor, and several others - and the definitions vary greatly across countries and cultures, as well as among researchers. In the United States, the Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA) is the cornerstone of counter-trafficking efforts. It provides guidance for identifying and defining human trafficking, and it authorizes legislation and appropriations for subsequent counter-trafficking measures both within and outside of the federal government. First enacted in 2000, the TVPA has since been reauthorized by three administrations, and it includes a directive for the President to establish an Interagency Task Force to Monitor and Combat

Trafficking. The subsequent Frederick Douglass Trafficking Victims Prevention and Protection Reauthorization Act of 2018 also includes provisions for victim services and plans to enhance collaboration efforts to fight trafficking abroad. To explore current and innovative sampling methods, technological approaches, and analytical strategies for estimating the prevalence of sex and labor trafficking in vulnerable populations, a 2-day public workshop, *Approaches to Estimating the Prevalence of Human Trafficking in the United States*, was held in Washington, D.C. in April 2019. The workshop brought together statisticians, survey methodologists, researchers, public health practitioners, and other experts who work closely with human trafficking data or with the survivors of trafficking. Participants addressed the current state of research on human trafficking, advancements in data collection, and gaps in the data. They discussed international practices and global trends in human trafficking prevalence estimation and considered ways in which collaborations across agencies and among the U.S. government and private-sector organizations have advanced counter-trafficking efforts. This proceedings summarizes the presentations and discussions of the workshop.

**Gender, Sexuality and Peace Education** Laura L. Teens and Sex Trafficking Education and Awareness Workshop for Social Work and Foster Care Professionals Beverly Thompson 2015 Human trafficking is a \$32 billion industry, involving 100,000 children in the United States. Children in care commonly experience emotional impacts due to neglect, abuse, multiple placements and caregivers, school disruptions, among many other issues. Attachment disorders are quite commonly underlying causes of emotional and behavioral problems for these children. Because of their intense need for survival and protection, these children may become attached to adults who abuse or threaten them. A lack of options for safety and survival often compel vulnerable youth, like youth in care, to become involved in the street economy. In general, traffickers target those who are most vulnerable, because they are easier to control. Many teens recruited by pimps know they are trading an oppressive situation in a shelter, group home, or foster family for a pimp who might prove violent, abusive, or exploitative. This 4-hour workshop included speakers and a panel discussion for social workers and foster care professionals in Oakland, California. Presenters and panel discussion participants include the director of education from Love Never Fails Us, the executive director of Missesey Organization that works with victims, and co-founder and survivor of sex trafficking from Bridget's Dream who collaboratively planned the content and structure of the workshop with the student facilitating the seminar. Social work professionals and service providers determined the workshop was highly beneficial to them in supporting existing and future clients.

Sex Work on Campus Terah J. Stewart 2022-05-17 Sex Work On Campus examines the experiences

of college students engaged in sex work and sparks dialogue about the ways educators might develop a deeper appreciation for—and praxis of—equity and justice on campus. Analyzing a study conducted with seven college student sex workers, the book focuses on sex work histories, student motivations, and how power (or lack thereof) associated with social identity shape experiences of student sex work. It examines what these students learn because of sex work, and what college and university leaders can do to support them. These findings are combined in tandem with analysis of current research, popular culture, sex work rights movements, and exploration of legal contexts. This fresh and important writing is suitable for students and scholars in sexuality studies, gender studies, sociology, and education.

**Sex Trafficking in State-Authorized Massage Schools** Ellie M. Bruecker 2021 This brief is the first research paper on sex trafficking at vocational schools in the United States. Some state authorizers and massage education experts believe this to be a widespread problem in higher education. We explore a recent Minnesota case where a state authorizer ordered the closure of an institution due to an explicit suspicion of sex trafficking, and the subsequent processes that enabled that school to continue operations without losing Title IV eligibility. In this case, the regulatory triad functioned exactly as designed: an exemplary state authorizer identified areas of non-compliance, notified the accreditor and the U.S. Department of Education, and ordered the closure of the school. The majority of the 57 state agencies that responded to our outreach were unaware of the issue or claimed that it was not a problem in their state. We contend that many state authorizers of postsecondary education may be ill-equipped to address this issue - and unprepared to notice the red flags that may indicate that a school is engaged in behaviors connected to sex trafficking. State governments must take immediate steps to investigate the scale of trafficking in their states and to strengthen their regulatory framework to ensure that they only authorize schools - not sex trafficking operations. Moreover, the ease with which a school disciplined for suspected sex trafficking can continue to operate raises serious concerns about whether the triad can protect students from more mundane fraud, poor education quality, and insufficient earnings outcomes at for-profit institutions within their jurisdictions.

Human Trafficking Education Module for Healthcare Providers Katlyn Sargent Sheets 2021 "Human trafficking (HT) is an epidemic within the United States, resulting in what could be deemed a public health crisis. HT remains concealed due to the criminal, secretive nature of the enterprise, in addition to inconsistent definitions, historically perpetuated biases, and stigmas, in addition to an overall lack of education, knowledge, and awareness. Data around HT are also minimal due to these same barriers. The majority of HT victims report accessing the emergency department and hospital during their time of trafficking, placing healthcare professionals in a unique position to recognize and assist victims. Studies indicate that few healthcare professionals have general knowledge of HT and no healthcare professionals report having formal education or training around HT. No standardized education or training exists for healthcare professionals concerning HT, and no standardized screening tool has been created to identify HT victims. Screening tools currently utilized have not been tested for sensitivity, specificity, or positive outcomes. The implementation and testing of an education and training system for healthcare professionals, and a screening tool for identifying HT victims, is imperative in affecting change within the United States to assist HT victims in advocating for their safety and ultimate freedom"--Abstract.

A Theological Method Critically Applied to the Narratives Used for Sex Trafficking and Prostitution Justin Shrum 2019-07-12 Seminar paper from the year 2018 in the subject Theology - Biblical Theology, London School of Theology, language: English, abstract: In this essay, we will consider the role that the theological method has in engaging with these narratives, especially focusing on the conflicting concepts between the abolitionist narrative and that of sex workers rights. The goal is to use the framework of the theological method to engage with key epistemological differences in the narratives, in order to determine a more balanced and effective approach. There are three primary narrative approaches to define the relationship between sex trafficking and prostitution. The first is that of abolition, where the lines of delineation between prostitution and trafficking are often

blurred and cases of exploitation within prostitution are categorized in a sex trafficking context. Here one commonly finds the language of rescue and restoration. In this context, individual actors such as pimps and traffickers, as well as the society itself which allows prostitution to flourish, are viewed as perpetrators. The second narrative is one of criminal justice, where the issue is framed by the language of legal prosecution against criminals and the war on trafficking done by the State and NGO actors. The third narrative is one of sex workers rights, where the human rights abuses surrounding prostitution are framed principally as gender migrant issues and the need for better working conditions is presented as the solution. Assistance from a sex workers rights approach speaks in terms of harm reduction and empowering agency among those in prostitution. This approach considers sex work to be a viable job when the conditions are correct and the women are free from exploitation. All narratives agree that sex trafficking is wrong. The departure takes place where views of prostitution are concerned. The prevalence of harm found in prostitution cause some to place it ontologically in the same category as sex trafficking while others would say that is overreaching and adds to the challenges women in prostitution face. In effect, presuppositions built by a commitment to any of these narratives tend to influence the orientation and praxis of an organization.

**Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children** Brandy Bang 2013-10-14 The commercial exploitation of children is a global crisis (Rahman, 2011; Svensson, 2006). However, media outlets and sociological researchers have successfully situated the problem as a primarily Asian, South American, or Eastern European concern. In the process, the exploitation of children in the United States has largely been ignored. The continued trafficking of international youth into this country, coupled with the growing rate at which American born children are targeted by interstate sex traffickers, speaks to the urgency with which the domestic exploitation of children must be addressed (Walker-Rodriguez & Hill, 2011). In fact, research suggests that an average of 250,000 American children and adolescents are at risk of commercial exploitation each year (Estes & Weiner, 2001). Further, there are indications that current data vastly underestimate the actual numbers of vulnerable and victimized youth (Chase & Statham, 2005). According to the U.S. Department of Justice (2007), no systematic efforts have been made to examine the commercial exploitation of children in this country. The low visibilities of the crime, combined with the inherent vulnerability of the victims, have facilitated the continued victimization of these children. The purpose of this book is to provide a critical analysis of the domestic, commercial exploitation of children. A careful explanation of the differing forms of commercial exploitation of children, victim and offender

characteristics, and the mechanisms which maintain the problem will assist health care providers, researchers, and law enforcement in their efforts with this marginalized and understudied population. The authors begin with a comprehensive review of extant literature in this area. Additionally, case studies of child sexual exploitation are included to further illustrate the severity, complexity, and depravity of commercial exploitation in real life cases.

Human Trafficking: A Global Health Emergency Mary de Chesnay 2023-08-30 This book presents various forms of human trafficking, a growing trend in the exploitation of large numbers of people with concurrent public health, socio-cultural, and economic costs to countries burdened with the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic. Human Trafficking Education Within Nursing School Melissa B. Dyer 2022 Internationally, human trafficking is a growing, \$150 billion industry. It is estimated that 40 million people are being trafficked at any one time. Human trafficking is often referred to as modern-day slavery. Because of the hidden nature of the crime, definitions, estimates, and data about it are lacking. All human trafficking definitions include a victim being involuntarily forced into labor or sex acts through force, fraud, or coercion. At least 99% of victims have health problems, making victims one of the least

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healthy groups of people in the world. In addition to a host of individual health concerns and untreated chronic conditions, victims are disease vectors. They have alarmingly high rates of communicable infections (including sexually transmitted infections, tuberculosis, HIV/ AIDS, and may share needles used for drugs). They frequently live in close quarters and in unsanitary conditions, causing public health concerns among other victims and nearby communities. According to the literature, 88% of victims of human trafficking are seen by a healthcare provider. However, victims are too infrequently identified. These are missed opportunities. As the healthcare system's first line of defense, nurses have a unique opportunity to identify victims and provide essential interventions. Education, though, is key to recognizing and assessing red flags, identifying victims, and providing interventions. Teaching large numbers of nurses is a huge undertaking, which creates challenges in developing the best approach to reach those nurses. Nursing faculty are in a position to teach huge numbers of new nurses about human trafficking and the role of the nurse in assessing, identifying, and providing victims for victims. This study examines this group of nurse educators. In this study, a modified version of the previously developed PROTECT questionnaire was used to measure nursing faculty members' actual knowledge, perceived knowledge, and confidence about teaching human trafficking. The study's survey also included questions about faculty viewpoints. The sample size for this study was 113. Nursing faculty from five universities in Ohio were surveyed about the inclusion of human trafficking in their nursing programs. The great majority of faculty, 92.6%, contend it is important to include human trafficking content. However, only 34.9% of faculty respondents' programs actually include human trafficking content. These results indicate there is a gap between reality and desire to teach the topic, which indicates there is a need to educate nursing faculty about their role in educating nurses about human trafficking. A full 73.6% of those faculty surveyed felt community and mental health courses are the best fit for human trafficking content, potentially connecting the role of the nurse in identifying victims in a public health setting. This study examines nursing faculty actual knowledge, perceived knowledge, confidence, known or suspected contact with a victim, and previous education about human trafficking, related to teaching. The relationship between these variables and teaching were examined. Data analysis strategies included chi square and, if there was a relationship, logistic regression. Multivariate regression was used to explain relationships when univariate analyses indicated a relationship. Odds ratios were also calculated. Nursing faculty viewpoints about teaching human trafficking were also considered. The relationship between faculty members' perceived knowledge of human trafficking and teaching human trafficking content was statistically significant throughout all data analyses. Faculty members who had previous education about human trafficking or had known or suspected contact with a victim were also more likely to teach nursing students about this topic and reported more perceived knowledge. Interestingly, there was not a statistically significant relationship between actual knowledge about human trafficking teaching the topic. These findings suggest improving faculty perceived knowledge about human trafficking may increase the likelihood of teaching human trafficking content. Inclusion of human trafficking on the NCLEX-RN and Accreditation of nursing programs may be another incentive to include this content. In addition, this paper recommends preparing interested nurses for advocacy efforts so that legislation requiring nurse education programs to include human trafficking is considered and adopted by policymakers.

Sex, Slavery and the Trafficked Woman Ramona Vijayarasa 2016-03-03 Sex, Slavery and the Trafficked Woman is a go-to text for readers who seek a comprehensive overview of the meaning of 'human trafficking' and current debates and perspectives on the issue. **Acts of Violence in the School Setting** Kimberly A. McCabe 2020-01-08 Since the year 2000, there have been approximately 200 school shootings in the United States. Unfortunately, this is not simply a U.S. problem. In 2017, a 15-year-old Canadian male student committed suicide after shooting two other students and a teacher. During that same year, in Brazil, a private school student fatally shot two classmates and injured four. In 2018, a 13-year-old Russian girl opened fire with a gas pistol and injured seven 7th graders. Hence, school violence is a problem of global concern. *Acts of School Violence in A School Setting* addresses this international problem from a crime and criminal justice perspective. The history of school violence follows the pattern of what most would consider the history of education. According to the U.S. Department of Justice, current research has shown a decline in the rates of school violence over the past three years; however, the few high-profile cases broadcast repeatedly in the media lead the public to other conclusions. All individuals agree that a child attending school should be concerned with the process of learning, not with avoiding victimization and that the school environment should be a safe and secure location for both students and teachers. In addition, and most central to this text, without a safe school environment, students and teachers may be assaulted, injured, or killed. Included in this textbook are definitions related to the types and categories of school violence (including bullying, stalking, and crimes against students that involve the internet), discussions on victims and offenders, and case examples. Also included in this textbook is information on criminal justice system responses to school violence from both a national and international perspective. Finally, this textbook discusses adult perpetrators of school violence and the explanations for such attacks.

Therefore, the victims of this painful chain are not only young girls and boys but also families. Unfortunately, some parents, especially mothers, have also been perpetrators of this deplorable crime. They push their daughters into the arms of their torturers, lulled by the dream of a brighter future. To stop and to prevent the reoccurrence of this criminal network of complicity, which has been more or less voluntary, conscious and unconscious, a joint commitment by all governments, organizations, local communities, and individuals is necessary. Everyone needs to remember and never forget that every human being, every person has been created and procreated in the image and likeness of God and is a subject of essential rights, which should never be violated but rather should be respected and upheld by everyone in every time and place.

*Sex Trafficking and Commercial Sexual Exploitation* Lara B.
